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About the Role:

In 2025 LGBT Foundation is celebrating 50 years since the roots of the organisation were first established with a year-round celebration and campaign. Activity planned throughout next year will raise awareness of the history of the groundbreaking LGBTQ+ wellbeing services we have offered, showcase achievements of the past five decades and explore our community's hopes for the next steps of the organisation.

As part of the celebrations LGBT Foundation will be showcasing some of its archive material and the voices of those who have been involved in organisations associated with the history of LGBT Foundation over the past 50 years. As a 50th Anniversary Digital Storyteller you will perform a vital role in gathering stories as part of the 50th anniversary celebrations, assisting with oral history capture, sound editing and transcribing, digital campaigns and capturing new community stories as part of an exhibition about LGBT Foundation's history.

A role on the team would suit those who are looking for experience in digital storytelling and have a passion for LGBT histories/heritage, equalities, archives and community voice.

This role involves **approximately 2 hours per week of volunteering**, with sessions to take place **in person** at Manchester Central Library and LGBT Foundation's Community Hub in Manchester.

Typical duties

This role is flexible so if there are particular areas of the role you'd like to focus on, please let us know as part of your application.

- Searching our archive materials to fact-check stories and find related images/materials for the 50th anniversary
- Giving support to a range of promotional events and exhibitions across 2025
- Supporting the capture and cataloguing of oral histories and contemporary stories to expand our archive
- Sound editing and transcribing oral histories that have been collected
- Taking part in team meetings for the project with the volunteer team and staff from LGBT Foundation/Archives+
- Helping share content from our archives digitally including through our social media and website

- Able to carry archive materials for short durations and distances
